A story in a name ~ Dr. Monica Sommer Vera Green Cochrane

My names of Sommer & Vera...

It was the Summer of '69 when I was born to two young parents. My mother, Nancy Sommer, and biological father, Frank Vera, were only 17 when I was born in Ontario, California. Before the ripe 'ol age of 21, my mother had a daughter and married twice. Interestingly enough, to my knowledge, none of the women in my family ever graduated high school yet they were bound with great wisdom, love, and strength. I learned recently that during the first few years of my life, my biological father, got into some legal trouble in California and relocated permanently to Iowa. Soon after my mother remarried, he agreed to I have fond memories of my childhood sign the adoption papers.

The first few years of my life, I was blessed to have a close relationship with my grandparents, my mom's parents, forming a lifelong bond. My grandmother was raised by her grandparents when her mother passed away at an early age. I was extremely close to my grandmother throughout my life and my grandfather adored me until he passed away when I was seven years of age. I learned many life lessons from my grandmother...From "everything happens for a reason" to "we make our own happiness in this world."

My name of Green...


My mother dropped out of high school and worked to support us until she married my father, Ronald Green, when I

was four years old. Everything happens for a reason...I consider myself extremely fortunate to have been raised by two wonderful parents who instilled strong moral values in me. I find it ironic that I have one father who sought to escape the law and another one that was the law. My father is a retired Captain for the El Segundo Police Department.

I grew up in the South Bay with one brother, Michael Green, who is six years, my junior. Growing up, my brother, Mike, was a terror to his sister. Today, Mike has turned terror to terrific. He is good, supportive brother as well as a fantastic husband and father to his three children. Mike is a Redondo Beach Police Officer.

I grew up playing softball and it is that experience that weaved the value of teamwork, determination, and a healthy sense of competition into my fabric. I started my first job at 12 years of age and bought my first car at 16 years of age with the help of my parents. This continued to spur my independent, industrious nature. In my early teens, I got involved in student government and community service. This not only instilled in me the worth of service to others but I spent much of my time with kids who aspired to go to college. I began learning more about college and this expanded my world. When I was 17 years old, I moved away from home to attend college at the University of California, Riverside.

After about five years of marriage, our first daughter, Jacqueline, was born. Jacqueline was born with a congenital heart disease that required surgery at six years of age. For the first two years of her life, her cardiologist suggested we not let her cry for extended periods of time. During this time, we were very fortunate to have my grandmother assist in caring for Jacqueline as well as two sets of doting grandparents. Jacqueline was the first grandchild in both families and her birth brought us altogether as a strong family network.

Three years after Jacqueline's birth, Nicole, our second daughter, was born healthy with a strong disposition and a set of lungs. Nicole was quite fussy and wanted her mother most of the time through her toddler years. I never thought that I would miss those days but, oh, how I miss those days!

When the girls where six and three, I realized that it was time for job change. My grandmother instilled in me the concept that we make our own happiness in our lives. I think it is this simple concept that has propelled me during many points of my life to pursuit more, most importantly, to pursuit happiness. Within a few weeks of realizing that I needed a job change, I began working as a counseling faculty member at Riverside Community College District developing a new grant. I found my passion and it led me to pursuit a doctorate degree in education. I am so blessed to do something day in and day out that I love. Education changes lives, it changes families, it enriches our community. I currently serve as the Vice President of Student Services at Norco College.

I did not realize until recently how much my life choices to pursuit education and serve in education had changed my family dynamics. Remember, I was the first woman in my family that I know that completed a high school diploma. Having completed my doctorate degree, when my children were still young, left an everlasting impression on them. It dawned on me a few years ago to ask them both if not going to college was an option for them. With that question, I got that typical teenage look and the response of "of course, I am going to college." My two



Optimizing your Virtual Meeting Experience by Laura Janik

We love the flexibility of being able to conduct our monthly business meeting virtually. It saves us all travel time, and enables some of our club members to attend that otherwise would not be able to. But we could all help in the success and enjoyment of the virtual meeting experience by following a few of these tips:

Joining by Computer (this is the optimal experience):

- 1. Open the meeting email that contains the meeting information.
- 2. Click the Join link provided in the invitation to join the meeting.
- 3. Enter the password provided
- 4. Sound is best using headphones with a mic (most cell phone headphones will work well). You can also use the computer's mic and speakers.
- 5. Please mute yourself at all times unless you are talking: Go to your Control Panel and click the Square microphone icon. You will see a cross through it if you are mut-



ed. To unmute, click the green icon again.

Joining by Computer and Phone:

If joining by Computer, and you do not have a headset or speakers, you can also call in by phone, and follow along with the meeting on the computer. If you are calling in to the meeting, remember to always hit *6 after you are in the meeting. This will mute your line- you will be able to hear the meeting, but all the rest of the attendees won't hear all the background noise in your location. Even if you think your location is quiet, having your line unmuted will create mic feedback (fuzzy static) that overpowers the active speaker of the meeting. When you want to talk, just hit *6 again.

Joining by Phone only:

If you are calling in to the meeting, remember to always hit *6 after you are in the meeting. This will mute your line- you will be able to hear the meeting, but all the rest of the attendees won't hear all the background noise in your location. Even if you think your location is quiet, having your line unmuted will create mic feedback (fuzzy static) that overpowers the active speaker of the meeting. Gin Punch


Ingredients:

- · Decorative ice block
- 6 navel oranges, cut into quarter-wheels
- 6 lemons, cut into half-wheels
- 3 limes, cut into wheels
- 1 pint fresh raspberries
- 1 pineapple, cut into 1-inch cubes
- 1 (750 ml) bottle Plymouth gin
- 1 3/4 cups freshly squeezed lemon juice
- 1 1/4 cups simple syrup
- 1/2 cup orgeat or almond syrup
- 1 cup Massenez crème de framboise
- 3 cups water
- 1 (750 ml) bottle Perrier-Jouët Grand Brut champagne

Preparation:

Prepare the decorative ice block, allowing a few hours for freezing.

Combine all the fruits in a large punch bowl. Add the gin, juice, syrups, crème de framboise, and water. Refrigerate for at least 4 to 5 hours. Just before serving, add the champagne and the decorative ice block.



Sweet Potato Casserole


Sweet Potato Mix Ingredients

- 2 and 1/2 cups cooked, mashed sweet potatoes (either bake, microwave, or cook the potatoes on the stove)
- 2/3 cup granulated sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 teaspoon vanilla extract
- · 1 egg, beaten
- 3 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted

Crust Ingredients

- 2/3 cup brown sugar
- 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1/2 finely chopped pecans
- 3 tablespoons butter, melted
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

Preparation

- 1. Pre-heat your oven to 350 degrees and prep a medium to small sized casserole dish with cooking spray. I used a 9×9 inch casserole dish.
- 2. Use a mixer to whip together cooked, mashed sweet potatoes, granulated sugar, salt, vanilla, egg, butter. Mix until the potatoes are light and fluffy.
- 3. Pour the potato mixture into the prepared casserole dish and bake for 30 minutes.
- 4. Meanwhile, combine the crust ingredients in a small bowl brown sugar, flour, pecans, butter and vanilla.
- 5. Sprinkle the crust over the casserole after it has baked for 30 minutes. Bake for 10-15 minutes longer, until the pecan crust is lightly browned and crunchy
