## Inspiring Women through Soroptimism by Michelle Volante



Born in Torrance and spent my younger years in Redondo Beach. It was my parents and my sister Tami and I, she's 5 years older. When I was 6, we moved to Rancho Palos Verdes. My sister and I went to a small Lutheran school in Redondo Beach so we didn't know anyone in our neighborhood for many years. Not until my sister started the local high school, Rolling Hills. Because my parents both worked, my sister was so much older, and I didn't go to school in the area, I had a pretty lonely childhood. That's where I picked up my love of books. But things improved when I started at Rolling Hills High School. Easily one of the scariest days of my life. I came from a school where I knew everyone, there were 15 kids in my graduating class, I was this short, dorky girl with giant glasses, I didn't know a soul. It was terrifying. But I survived and made some dear friends that are still with me today. I also started dating a guy that I ended up dating for 7 years, Shawn. He treated me horribly and I should have broken up with him a dozen times, but I was naïve, thought he was 'the one', made excuses for him for years. We started dating our sophomore year of high school and continued all through college, we both went to USC. I was completely convinced we were going to get married. Then I met a guy at my first real job after college, working the Front Desk at the LAX Hilton. The first moment I met him, I didn't like him, he rubbed me the wrong way, he was cheesy and he didn't follow directions. He cut corners and the worst part, no one else seemed to be on to him. Everyone else loved him. He was the golden child of the front desk. No matter how sarcastic and short I was with him, this guy was just nice. Always. And funny. It was so irritating. So obviously he was starting to grow on me. And it became obvious that I was growing on him. He started leaving me notes at work, he gave me a little box of rose

petals. I learned much later that after that first meeting he told a co-worker that he was going to marry me someday. But I was still dating Shawn. I had a plan. But the more I talked to this guy, it was Fernando, my husband, the more I realized that Shawn treated me like dirt and my plan was horribly flawed. With the understanding, finally, that I deserved to be treated better, I broke up with Shawn after 7 wasted years.

Fernando and I moved to Las Vegas a year later, him so he could get his bachelor's in Hotel Management and me so I could get my master's in Hotel Management. I lasted one semester but Fernando graduated while we were there. We both worked for Hilton Corporate at an Information Services satellite office. We lived there for 5 years. He proposed there, we got married while we were living there, and got pregnant with our daughter Gianna while we there. With Gianna on the way we decided it was time to get back to California and be near family. I worked at the Hilton Corporate office in Beverly Hills and we bought a house in Torrance. I was convinced I was going to be the ultimate working mom: business suit and heels, baby in one arm, briefcase in the other. Yeah, that all went out the window the moment she was born. I never went back to Hilton after my maternity leave. I found a job 15 minutes away at the same company Fernando was working at but that wasn't enough. I wanted to stay home. Then 6 months later, we found out I was pregnant with Izzi! So we had 2 babies, 14 months apart, both working full-time, by this time our company had been sold and we were working in Irvine, still living in Torrance. It was exhausting. The first few years are a blur. And we both spent so little time with the girls. We had to make a change. So in April of 2001, when the girls were 1 and 2, we moved here to Corona. We still worked in Irvine, but we were work-

ing on a plan so I could stay home. And in July of 2002, I left the working world and became a stay at home mom. It was exactly what I wanted, what we had rearranged our lives for. Unfortunately it wasn't as rosy as I had hoped. I was busy yes, but my mind was being exercised. I soon started falling into depression that I hid remarkably well, from everyone. By 2008, I was a mess and I started detaching from everyone. By 2009 I was spirally out of control. Trying anything to find a moment of light. I drank. A lot. I spent money like crazy. I blew through our savings in less than a year, with nothing to show for it. I slept all afternoon, leaving the girls to fend for themselves after school. It was a dark, dark time for me and for my family but they didn't know why. I finally got help in late 2009 but a lot of damage had been done. Fernando tried to stand by me, but I still kept him at a distance. I wouldn't let him in all the way. I continued a routine of self-preservation, not being completely honest with him. We separated in early 2010. A huge rift formed between my parents and sister and Fernando. They blamed each other for what I was going through. It was a horrible, painful time. After several months, we agreed to divorce but Fernando changed his mind almost immediately, he couldn't bear the thought of not being with the girls. So we started over. I put down my shield, showed him all the dark and sad inside of me, was completely honest with him, and he stood by me. We've been back together, moving forward for 4 years now. I still battle with depression, I have to tell it who's boss every day, but I'm not doing it alone any more. I share it with Fernando and a few other friends who travelled the road with me. Unfortunately, the relationship between my parents, my

### Action Update

12 bills recently passed in the House of Representatives and are now up for vote in the Senate. These bills will hold traffickers and "Johns" more accountable and provide meaningful services to victims.

Over 5,500 Dreamers took action and urged Congress to support these bills, which were expected to pass with little objection. However, the Justice for Victims of

Trafficking Act is currently stalled in the Senate due to partisan debate regarding certain nuances of the bill. The debate caused the bill to fall short of the 60 votes needed to move it forward. Senate Republicans have vowed to bring the bill back to the floor, and Senate Democrats have promised to hold up the bill until the provision of restricted funds is removed, signifying a potentially long political battle. Stay tuned for more updates!

### COMING UP: Sexual Assault Awareness Month

Sexual assault is occurring on college campuses at alarming rates, and many schools have done a poor job of protecting survivors and holding perpetrators accountable. We will take action by urging Congress to support the Campus Accountability and Safety Act.

## Inspiring Women through Soroptimism

I was born and raised in Bridgeport, Connecticut. Brought up in an ethnically mixed neighborhood. I learned early the skills necessary to get along with others. I was very involved in activities in high school. The caption under my yearbook picture reads "First in activities and first in the hearts of her classmates".

My ethnic background is Irish and German. Physically I look like my father's family; my mother, Rose, was tiny and small boned. My maternal relatives valued education. My mother and father went only as far as the 8th grade. I was the first person in my father's family to graduate from college. I knew I wanted to be a teacher in kindergarten, where I adored my teacher, Helen Wargo.

I am my mother's only child. I had a half brother/we shared the same birthday! He died 2 years ago. I also have a foster brother in South Carolina. My parents raised many foster children over the years which I think helped me decide to work to better the lives of children. As a child and young adult, I took dance and voice lessons.

My college years began at the University of Connecticut, where I followed my high school sweetheart. Two years later when he broke my heart, I "ran away" to Florida and finished my B.A. in English at the University of Miami. While there, I became a member of Chi Omega Sorority and am still in touch with several of my sisters. I was offered a teaching position at Miami Senior High, but I decid-

ed to go home. I was having second thoughts about my career. I applied for some teaching jobs and took the state exam for social work. I got my score on the test with an offer to work on the same day. I received a teaching position interview. I accepted the teaching job and never looked back.

My teaching career began in Trumbull, Connecticut, teaching English and Drama in a suburban high school. While at Trumbull High, I began work on my Master's Degree at Fairfield University, a Jesuit institution. A life-long Catholic, I had never attended a Catholic school. Let me just say, the Jesuits are incredible teachers.

While teaching in Trumbull, I started my plan to move to California, at the urging of my friend Ruth Kremer, who I had met at the University of Connecticut. She needed a roommate and I knew I had to go someplace warm (again).

California required a Master's Degree, so I had to hurry up and finish. I was hired by Corona Unified in May of 1964 over the phone. In order to start work in September, I had to finish two more classes in American Literature, complete my thesis/which was on The American Musical Theatre/ and take oral exams. That was quite a summer.

On the long cross country trip, Ruth gave me the scoop on all the people I would meet. Her mother insisted that I should marry Bob Kremer, since we were both Catholic. Ruth had dated Roger Rickson, band director at Corona High School, a few times and introduced us at the new teacher breakfast at The Hickory Bar-be-

que. All that fall, Bob would call on Thursday night and ask out which of us answered the phone. Forty-nine years later I still insist that he married her because she answered the phone more often. Bob still refers to me as his "Mistress". We are still close friends.

My move to California occurred in 1964. I adapted easily to the life style, often telling others, "I'm a native Californian who happened to be born in Connecticut". My teaching career in California included English and Drama teacher and English Department Chair at Corona High. I was instrumental in the designing of the English/Social Studies building and the Little Theatre while at Norco High School.

My first formal date with Roger was on May 11, 1965. Check out my license plate. This began a 40 year relationship which ended with his death in 2003. He was the love of my life. In 2011 I started an endowed scholarship in his name at RCC.

In 1979, I moved to the junior high level and became an Assistant Principal. For the next 12 years, I served in every area known to a junior high administrator. I was very involved with the planning and implementation of the Middle School Program. My career continued as Assistant Principal at Norco Intermediate School, where I met the children of the students I taught at Norco High. I have been retired since 1999.

I was very fortunate to have great men-

tors during my career. FM Doss had a profound effect on the directions my life took, both in and out of the classroom. She and Dick adopted me and I spend many happy times with them in Norco, Corona, and San Diego. FM brought me to Soroptimist in 1970 and I am still here as a life member. We started the "S" Club together at Norco High and she made sure I was involved in all the club activities. Another Soroptimist in my life was Shirley Mills, Assistant Superintendent of Schools. Shirley was a guiding force for me--I miss them both. I am very proud of be a recipient of a "Woman of Distinction Award" from Soroptimist of Corona in 1991 and the "Women Helping Women Award" in 2001. I am a Laurel Society Member. Currently, I serve on the Historian Committee and am the "quote queen".

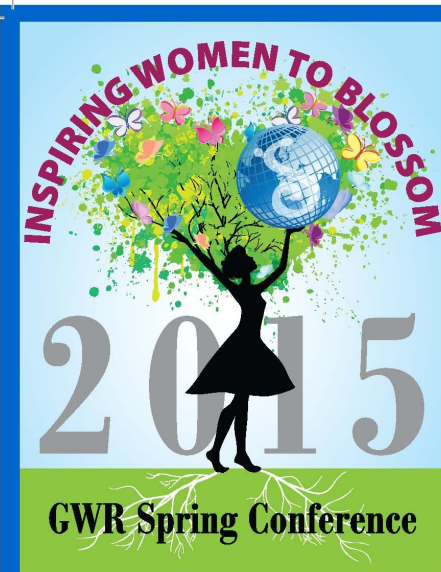

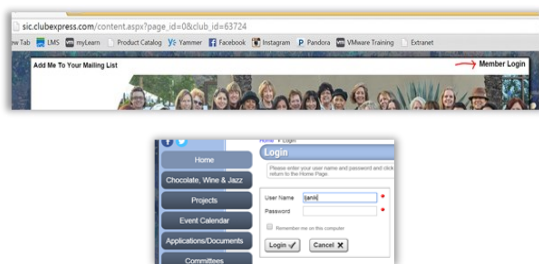
## Update your Club Express Profile—Homework for all Members

We need 100% club participation to make our new website most effective and efficient. If you're a regular Club Express user already, then this is not new to you. But for those still unfamiliar with the site, please follow along to for instructions on how to edit your profile. Your club profile will only be viewable to members who log in.

First go to <https://sic.clubexpress.com> - (and be sure to bookmark it, so you have easy access later) Then go to "Member Login" in the upper right corner.



You'll see a login window pop up. Your login is your first initial and last name. Then, if you did not previously set up a password or forgot it, click the link below that says [Forgot My Username/Password](#).

Once you are logged in, click on the Membership Directory Tab on the left side, and search for your name. You can then click your profile and update all your personal information.

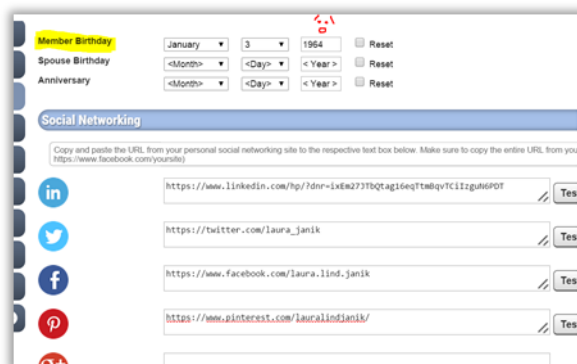


There are 3 sections to update:

#1 – Upload your photo by clicking the silhouette, which will let you choose a photo on your computer. (No puppies or kittens please, just beautiful you).

#2 – Click the pencil next to "Basic Information" and fill in your "General Info" (ignore member #), use your home address for primary address, and your home or primary phone #, "Other Contact" section is for cell phone #, email address, and your work website if you'd like it listed, then also fill in the "Work Info" section. And hit "SAVE".

#3 – Click the pencil next to "Biography". Fill in your birthdate (this is required info, and SIA needs all birth years), spouse bday and anniversary is optional. If you use social websites and would like members to connect with you, you can add your sites here. You can also add a bio about yourself if you'd like.



That's it! Thank you for keeping your club profile up to date!

**Useful Tip** – if you'd like to add a member to your personal address book, you can click the Index Card icon under the member's photo, and it will download the address/phone to your computer address book.
