# A Financial Glimpse into our Past


Here is a page from SI Corona's Treasurer's Report, dated October 7, 1968.

President Flora Spiegel had been installed in June, and Treasurer JoAnn Garton carefully documented the Club's year-ending balances and the Fall activity going into a new year, after the customary summer break.

Some things never change . . . SI Corona collected and remitted dues, made a little extra on raffles and fines (usually .25 -.50 each), and as always, disbursed Service Funds to local organizations in need of support: Boys Club, Junior Achievement and others. A florist bill of \$5.25 and insurance expense of \$48.00 sound like very careful money management.

At the bottom line, nowadays, a bank balance of \$612.84 might be a scary situation! However, I'm sure the club felt comfortably solvent back in 1968.

SI Corona was a member of Pacific Region, under Governor Eileen Bidwell of El Centro. The club met every Wednesday for lunch at the Corona Bowl, owned by Ira "Cal" and Marceline "Marsha" Calvert (SI Corona President 1966-67), the parents of our own Congressman Ken Calvert, still a Corona resident.

# **Scholarship Program**

One of the most important things Soroptimist International of Corona does is support the educational aspirations of the young women in our community. Every spring, Soroptimist International of Corona participates in the awarding of high school scholarships and intermediate school recognition.

Our members teamed up to partake in nearly 80 high school interviews where we had an opportunity to hear these amazing student stories. It is truly inspiring and hopeful to hear from these young women in our community. After much deliberation, members were asked to select one scholarship recipient from ten of the high schools within Corona Norco Unified School District who are not necessarily at the top of their class but have shown a commitment to service and aspire to go to college. SI Corona provides these fortunate scholarship recipients with \$500 towards their first year in college.

Similarly, SI Corona lifetime member, Sylvia Fleming, collaborates with 12 intermediate schools to identify one female scholar who is committed and engaged at her school.

On May 13, 2015, we honored 22 of these young, dedicated female scholars at our annual luncheon at TAPS Fish House in Dos Lagos. This was our biggest luncheon in our clubs history where we had 118 students, school representative, and family members attend this scholarship and recognition celebration. The event was so big that we had to move into a larger area!

On this glorious day, we awarded these aspiring future Soroptimists with a total of nearly \$6,000 in educational support. Just one more example of how Soroptimist International of Corona contributes greatly to education of the young women in our community.

### **Bacon and Cheese Quiche** Ingredients:

- 3 ounce can of bacon bits
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- ounces shredded Swiss cheese
- 3 ounces of grated Parmesan cheese
- 9 inch deep dish frozen pie crust
- 4 eggs lightly beaten
- 1/3 cup milk
- 1 cup half & half

### **Directions:**

- 1. Preheat oven to 400 degrees F (200 degrees C).
- 2. In a medium bowl, mix the bacon, onions, and both cheeses. Place this mixture in the unthawed pie crust.
- Mix the eggs and half and half in a bowl. Pour the egg mixture over the cheese mixture.
- Bake in preheated oven for 15 minutes. Reduce heat to 350 degrees and bake for an additional 35 minutes, until top of quiche begins to turn brown.

We know many current members joined because of someone they know: their mother, sister, or aunt was already a member, or even a co-worker or friend is a member. We are gathering family and friends stories from across the federation and will be sharing them as part of our upcoming recruitment campaign. I've heard you have a family connection within Soroptimist! I hope you are willing to share some information and be an example for other clubs. Will you help us out?

Names? Debra Dematteis-Miller (mom)/Morgan Miller (daughter)

What is your relationship? (mother/daughter, sisters, cousins, in-laws, etc.) mother/daughter

• Who was a member first? Why did you join? Debra has been a member since 1991. My husband and I had just started our business and I was looking to get to know some business women in the area as I had worked out of the area for many years and really didn't have any women friends in the area other than our neighbors. It has not only been the best decision to join this club for me personally as most of these women are now my best friends but also many are our business associates from our banker, mortgage lender, real estate broker, insurance broker, florist, printer, etc.

• Who was the second member in the relationship to join? Why did you join? I joined SI corona, because I saw over the years that my mom and her friends were helping the lives of women and girls around the our community. My parents since I could remember instilled in us that helping others helps the community we live in. Even if it's small all those small things you do to help people will one day add up to amazing things. My mother is a great role and so are all the SIA members. I'm so grateful I have the opportunity to help change women and girls!

• Did the original member recruit the other member? If so, why and how? Morgan had grown up going to meetings and volunteering throughout her youth. She had always planned to become a Soroptimist one day so once she was working back in the area and her position allowed her time to take during the day to attend meetings, she asked if she could be considered. I put her in touch with our membership chair and she was inducted shortly thereafter to a very happy group of women who had watched her grow up and were so happy for her return.

• What do you enjoy most about volunteering together, what are the benefits? Personally, I have gotten to see my daughter in a totally different realm, she decided to take the chair position of our annual Dreams and Decisions workshop this year. She had been one of the first attendees of this program many years ago when she was in 7th grade. Now at 29 years of age, she felt that she had insights to make a few changes to update the program as we are continuously looking to keep it fresh and pertinent to today's needs for 7th and 8th grade girls. I was so proud of the her thoughtful approach, I was so happy to take the back seat on this project as she was/is totally capable of leading a very diverse and energitic group of women. It was such a wonderful proud day for this mom to see her daughter so comfortable in front of 250 young girls. I can't even explain my pride.

• Has your relationship changed since you both became Soroptimists? If yes, how? Not really other than we always have known that we have each other trust so this is just another area that we are able to share ideas and perspectives between generations.

• Do you have any advice for other members who might be hesitant about asking someone in their family to join? I don't think we have been hesitant, as these young women have helped when available for many events over the years. With their school schedules, work schedules that at times take them out of town and young families they are making choices to join Soroptimist when they know it will be successful for all concerned.

# Inspiring Women through Soroptimism by Dr. April Moore



I grew up in Orange County and moved to Corona in the 4th grade. I loved school and learning and attended private school and was homeschooled in junior high and high school.

I had the opportunity to take classes at Norco College while in high school and believe that if JFK Middle College High School was around at the time, I would likely have attended. I earned my Bachelor of Arts in English from Vanguard University, my Master of Arts in Education with an emphasis in Instructional Technology from Chapman University, and an Ed.D. in K-12 Leadership in Urban Settings from the University of Southern California. After becoming a high school English teacher in another district, I quickly transferred to the Corona-Norco Unified School District (CNUSD), where I was already living with my husband. I have since had the opportunity to work at the county offices of education in San Bernardino and Riverside as an administrator in educational technology and literacy, and then came "home" to CNUSD as an administrator.

Since 2008, I have served in the capacities of high school assistant principal, district office coordinator, high school principal (at JFK, where I always belonged!), and now Director of Curriculum and Instruction at the district office.

I became a Soroptimist because I have always valued supporting women and girls to pursue and achieve their dreams. Prior to joining SI Corona, I have been a member of the American Association of University Women, was founding chairperson of our region's Women's Leadership Network for women in education, and wrote my dissertation on the topic of female superintendents in California, their networking and mentoring practices. For the past three years, Dr. Monica Green has encouraged me to join, and in my new position I have more flexibility that allows me to attend lunch meetings.
