President's Letter

Wow! I cannot believe a month has already past. I want to cherish each and every moment as your club president. I am honored to be a Soroptimist; a member of such a wonderful service club ~ SI Corona ~ voted the BEST in the Golden West Region; and a Club that does so much to improve the lives of women and girls.

In reading the latest issue of Golden West Region "Membership Moments" by Doris Churry, our GWR membership leader, it shocked me to find out, according the SIA statistics, that over 50% of members leave Soroptimist due to the lack of civility among its membership. Doris goes on to ask, "What is your leadership/ membership style? Are you a problem solver or do you fan the flames?" That led me to ponder the principles and ethical standards that I live by that ultimately impacts my leadership style. This is what I discovered...

My ethical standards are defined by three distinct dimensions: who I am; my relationship with others; and how I behave. These three dimensions encapsulate the principles and standards I aspire to live by and how I go about the decision making process. These standards are also the foundation for the spoken and unspoken rules we have within our own household and the ideals I hope to instill in my own children.

Ethical Standard #1 is respect for self and others.

While this standard sounds so simple, respect for self and others, it presents an abundance of possibilities in interpretation and application ~ which is always good when I reinforce this household rule with my children.

Ethical Standard #2 is the golden rule ~ "treat others how you wish to be treated."

When applying the Golden Rule to decision making, I not only consider how this affects me but also how it affects others as well as the social order. Life is about the relationships we form and cultivate in this world. If I neglect

to treat others with respect and in ways I seek others to treat me, it serves to jeopardize the ability to create value for myself and contribute to the value of others.

Ethical Standard #3 there are consequences for my behavior.

This principle is not only about accepting the consequences of one's behavior but being responsible and accepting responsibility for one's own thoughts, feelings, and behavior. It serves as a level of predictability in how I approach decision making and think critically about situations. Before action, I imagine how the action and the consequences of the decision will affect the wellbeing of others. Clearly civility is complex and so are my rambling thoughts...

I am so very proud to be a Soroptimist International of Corona member ~ a highly civil, loving group of well-intentioned women ~ we are respectful, strategic, caring, courteous, complex, kind, fair, decent, concerned, selfless, sincere, compassionate women who are amazing problem solvers who can change the world one women and girl at a time. In Loving Memory of Mary Arloene Watts

August 14, 1922 – August 5, 2013

Arloene Watts left Carson, Oregon in a wagon when she was one year old. Her father, Frank Boerner, was taking his new wife and baby back to his family homestead in Minnesota to care for his recently crippled father, a quadriplegic. Times were terribly tough on the farm during those early years and during the Depression. Arloene suffered from rickets, a disease caused by poor nutrition.

When Arloene was the only student entering the second grade in her area, the school district paid for her room and board in town. She boarded with different strangers just about every year until she entered West Central High School, a public boarding high school from which she graduated as valedictorian. While she was at West Central she contracted scarlet fever during an epidemic and was quarantined at the school. ment, including no running water or electricity on the farm, she and her two brothers were loved and adored by their parents, and they knew it. She had a very happy and loving childhood. She came to California when her uncle invited her to come live with him and attend free junior college with his son.

World War II broke out and she quit college, moved to Hollywood, roomed with two other girls in a Murphy bed studio apartment, and went to work as an executive secretary to the president of an airplane glider manufacturer.

While at college she had met a sailor on leave who corresponded with her for over a year, at which time he was finally stationed in San Diego. They reunited and on the fifth weekend Ed and Arloene were married. They had not yet met each other's families.

She and Ed took their growing family (she became preg-



nant on their honeymoon) to Hutchinson, Kansas for three years. They then returned to Lincoln, California (Ed's hometown) for four years and on to Burbank for three years. They finally settled in Corona in 1957.

Arloene was a Den Mother, Girl Scout Leader, Dance Instructor, PTA Membership Chair, Business Owner, Planning Commissioner, President of the Chamber of Commerce, President of Soroptimist International of Corona, President of Woman's Improvement Club, Director of the United Way, and Woman of the Year of a number of organizations. She truly lived a full, productive and wonderful life.

Double Layer Pumpkin Cheesecake Courtesy of The Foley House Inn, Savannah

Ingredients:

2 (8 ounce) packages cream cheese, softened

- 1/2 cup white sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 eggs
- I (9 inch) graham cracker crust
- I/2 cup pumpkin puree
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- I pinch ground cloves
- I pinch ground nutmeg
- 1/2 cup frozen whipped topping, thawed

Directions:

Preheat oven to 325 degrees F (165 degrees C).

In a large bowl, combine cream cheese, sugar and vanilla. Beat until smooth. Blend in eggs one at a time. Remove I cup of batter and spread into bottom of crust; set aside.

Add pumpkin, cinnamon, cloves and nutmeg to the remaining batter and stir gently until well blended. Carefully spread over the batter in the crust.

Bake in preheated oven for 35 to 40 minutes, or until center is almost set.



Allow to cool, then refrigerate for 3 hours or overnight.

Cover with whipped topping before serving.
