Thirty years ago SI Corona had three consecutive Presidents named Sylvia. All three of these women were hard-working, dedicated Soroptimists who gave their all to SI Corona. Here are a few highlights from "The Sylvia

The first "Holiday Fantasy Home Tour" fundraiser was held in December 1985, and featured a Tea with homemade cookies at the Woman's Improvement Clubhouse. Tickets sold for \$7.00, and four local homes were showcased in their "Holiday Best." With the popularity of Trivial Pursuit games, SI Corona designed "The Corona Centennial Trivia Game" as a fundraiser to support the Club's Ways & Means, the city's Centennial activities, and the new Alternatives to Domestic As always, our Club collaborated Violence program.

Major Service Projects included support of Alternatives to Domestic Violence Shelter for Battered Women, championed by Pat Miller (President 1974-75), plus the Pregnant Minor Program at Corona High with Joyce Pavez, (President 1980-81), CNUSD educator F.M. Doss (President 1970-71) and administrator Shirley Mills (President 1993-94).

A key feature in our newsletter this past year, to learn about SI Corona members' businesses and keys to their success.

Parkside Dental by Denise Middleton

A snippet of how our dental practice came to be:

My background is Accounting – I never imagined it would fit in so well in the Dental world. Upon my graduation from Cal Poly Pomona I worked for a large Accounting firm in Orange County. Jerry was accepted to Marquette Dental School a year later. Fortunately, the firm I worked for had an office in Milwaukee and I was able to transfer there. We carpooled in to the city; me to work and he to Dental School for 4 years. After Jerry's graduation from Dental School he began a Residency Program in Downey. We had a 1 year old, so I decided to take a break from the Accounting firm and look for a different job back in California.

Life kept us busy — the Residency Program ended, another child was born, and a practice for sale was found in Riverside. We purchased the practice in 1993, and my Accounting expertise was now put to work in our own business. We quickly settled in to Jerry performing all the dental procedures and I took care of the financial side of the business. This worked out quite well, and enabled me to be home with our three children. My "brain" work would start when he came home from the office with paperwork, and he would take over the child rearing while I went into my home office. Technology has enabled me to continue working from home, except now I'm able to do it all day.

The dental practice that we bought back in 1993 was largely managed care, and we spent many years transitioning out of that practice model. For some dentists it works; for us it didn't. Jerry would come home after long days at the office, seeing upwards of 20 patients a day – rushing from room to room with barely enough time to blink – and hate his job. His ethics wouldn't allow him to use cheaper materials or skimp on quality, which meant that he was losing money on every patient that walked in the door. So, we took a huge leap of faith and eliminated all the managed care insurance plans. Most of our patients stayed loyal, realizing it was more important to have a relationship with a dentist that they trusted

rather than seeking out the lowest cost.

In 1999 we moved the office location down the street from where we began. It was a great spot – across from Parkview Hospital and overlooking Hunt Park. It was in this location that we became Parkside Dental. After 10 years here we had the opportunity to move to the Riverwalk area of Riverside. We bought the office shell, and designed our dream office. We love that it is right on the border of Corona and Riverside – close to home, but not too far of a move away from where we were.

We've made a lot of investments in technology, and have the equipment to create same day crowns, do digital x-rays, provide invisible braces, do airway assessments for sleep apnea, and much more. We perform dentistry on all ages. A typical day might have us seeing a 2 year old for their very first dental visit, and doing a full mouth cosmetic reconstruction on the next patient, all while making sure to maintain a solid relationship with every patient.



Easy Cranberry Margaritas

Served at Afterglow hosted by Deb Murphy, these crisp and tart cocktails were a favorite. This recipe yields only 3 cups, so you'll want to double or triple for a party. Deb added frozen juice rings into the glass dispenser, which not only kept the beverage cool, but was pretty floating amongst fresh fruit.

Ingredients:

- 1 1/2 cups cranberry juice (I recommend using a brand that is 100% juice)
- 3/4 cup fresh lime juice
- 3/4 cup tequila
- 1/2 cup orange-flavored liqueur, such as Cointreau or Triple Sec
- ice cubes

Directions:

- Stir all ingredients together until blended.
- Serve over ice in sugar- or salt-rimmed glasses, garnished with fresh cranberries and lime wedges if desired.



Asparagus Mushroom Bacon Quiche

Ingredients:

- 6 ounces bacon, diced
- 1/2 pound asparagus, cut into 1-inch pieces 4 ounces baby bella (cremini) mushrooms, sliced
- 4 ounces shredded Swiss cheese
- 1 1/2 cups heavy whipping cream
- 4 large eggs
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- freshly ground black pepper to taste

Directions:

- Position oven rack to center position. Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Butter 10-inch pie plate.
- 2. Heat a large skillet over medium heat; cook and stir bacon in the hot skillet until crisp, 5 to 10 minutes. Remove bacon and drain all but 2 tablespoons grease from skillet. Cook and stir asparagus and mushrooms in the remaining bacon grease until asparagus is tender, about 5 minutes.
- 3. Remove skillet from heat and toss bacon into asparagus mixture. Spread asparagus-bacon mixture into the prepared pie pan. Sprinkle Swiss cheese over mixture.
- Whisk cream, eggs, salt, and pepper in a bowl. Pour egg mixture over asparagus-cheese mixture.
- 5. Bake in the preheated oven until quiche is set and a knife inserted in the center comes out clean, about 30 minutes.
