2019 Report of the Golden West Region **Laws and Resolutions Committee**

This report of proposed additional amendment to Golden West Region Bylaws is filed in accordance with Golden West Region Bylaws Article XIII.

Golden West 2016-2018 Laws and Resolutions Committee

PROPOSAL #1

Add section 12.1.1 Technical Amendments.

REASON FOR AMENDMENT - To allow the GWR Secretary to make nonsubstantive changes to the bylaws, without the need for a spring conference delegate vote.

GWR BYLAWS, 12.1.1

With the concurrence of the Laws & Resolution Committee and the GWR BOD, the GWR Secretary is authorized to make non-substantive alphanumeric, or grammatical changes to the component provisions of these bylaws. A change may be deemed non-substantive if it involves reorganization or renumbering of provisions, corrects spelling or grammar, and does not alter voting rights, rights of participation, or financial atters. Notice of technical amendments will be given in the call to conference but such amendments will nt be subect to a vote of the delegates. Technical amendents will become effective at the close of the conference.

on her feet and met another man but at the beginning of her second year of college she was both terrified and overjoyed to find out she was pregnant with her son. The domestic abuse and scare tactics she frequently received made her vulnerable and too scared to leave, but kept pushing forward to work two jobs and continue going to community college. She made the decision to move to Tucson to live with her father and worked for a year until she was given the opportunity to attend Northern Arizona University where she is working on getting a Bachelor of University studies with minors in Biology and Parks and Recreation. She ultimately wants to become a Park Ranger and work for the National Park Service along with helping rehabilitate wildlife.
